Outward investment of Chinese firms in Western economies





In recent years the increasing aspects of globalization have become more and more visible. From Japanese firms' wave of purchases in America in the 1980s and Vodafone's takeover of Germany's Mannesmann in 2000 to the more recent antics of private-equity firms, acquisitions have often prompted bouts of national angst.

Such concerns are likely to intensify over the next few years, for China's state-owned firms are on a shopping spree. Chinese buyers have accounted for a tenth of cross-border deals by value this year, bidding for everything from American gas and Brazilian electricity grids to a Swedish car company, Volvo. The Chinese government is actively encouraging its enterprises to invest overseas with its 'go out policy / 走出去战略', which the Chinese enterprises are happy to do.
